Consul General Rene Borghouts and Consul General from Vancouver Henk Snoeken to attend the unveiling of five more educational plaques around the obelisk at Light Horse Park. In attendance were Col. 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# This and that to the Windmills

Finally we are enjoying a few warmer days, after a very chilly April. We certainly are all yearning for some warmth and are looking forward to some sunshine this coming May.



I hope everyone had a good Easter in spite of the cold weather. The Windmills were served an Easter dinner on the Thursday before Easter and from what I heard it turned out well and everyone enjoyed their meal. Sorry I missed it. Roel and I were on a little road trip to the Vancouver/Victoria area over that period, but even over there, with flowers in bloom and everything looking so nice and green, the weather was cool along with a chilly wind. While we also managed to take a side trip to Vancouver Island, the main reason we travelled there was to watch our 16 year old twin grand daughters play in a soccer tournament in Burnaby B.C. Their team did okay considering this was the first time they played a game together as a team as well as outdoors. They played 3 games and the scores were 1-1, 2-2 and a loss of 3-1. These are the girls from the Phoenix soccer team who came out to sweep the gravel off the parking lot at the club the Saturday before (see page 13).

Meanwhile Jenny and Aris took an even longer road trip all the way to Pella Iowa USA where they dropped off some of our Dutch costumes in time for their annual Tulip Festival there. We are looking forward to hear about their adventures.

The seedlings we planted last month are doing well. They are still quite small but we have at least another 3 weeks before they can go outside. Come and take a look and if you are interested you can buy some dwarf sunflowers, kale, herbs or tomato seedlings. Even if you do not have a garden these plants do well in a pot on the patio or balcony.

On a chilly morning and in ankle deep fresh snow, on April 20th, John Stobbe, Frank and Riek, and myself, as representatives of the DCC, along with members of the SAHL regiment, attended a special ceremony at Light Horse Park. The occasion was the unveiling of 5 special plaques depicting the history of the Southern Alberta Light Horse regiment. Unfortunately the Dutch dignitaries from the consulate in Vancouver and the embassy in Ottawa, who were also scheduled to attend, were not able to make it, since their plane from Calgary was delayed that morning due to the heavy snowfall. Honorary Consul to the Netherlands Jerry Bouma, Senator Paula Simons and Edmonton city councillor Karen Principe were there to give a speech. Both Jerry Bouma and Paula Simons laid flowers at the cenotaph as well as at the Anne Frank statue. The story made the front page of the Edmonton Journal.

**The Second World War (1939 - 1945)**

With the outbreak of the Second World War, the predecessors of the South Alberta Light Horse Regiment would go to war primarily as the South Alberta Regiment (SAR) and moved to England in August 1942.

In 1943, SAR was redesignated as the 29th Armoured Reconnaissance Regiment. This unit was selected by Major-General E. Worthington to carry out reconnaissance for the 4th Canadian Armoured Division.

In 1944, the SAR landed on the beaches of Normandy, France. The Regiment proceeded to fight its way across Europe, through France, Belgium, the Netherlands and finally into the Rhineland on its way into Germany.

In France, the actions of Major David Currie of The South Alberta Regiment of St. Lambert-au-Blanc closed the Faislaux Gap and forced about 50,000 German soldiers to surrender. For this action, Major Currie was awarded the Victoria Cross - the Commonwealth's highest award for military bravery. This is the only Victoria Cross ever awarded to a member of the Canadian Armoured Corps.

As the South Alberta Regiment advanced through Northwest Europe, it liberated many towns and cities. The grateful citizens of France, Belgium and the Netherlands developed a close bond with the Canadian soldiers that endures to this day.

Edmonton and The Dutch city of Bergen op Zoom are twin cities as a result of the great bond between "Alberta's Regiment" and the people of the Netherlands.

**The South Alberta Light Horse Regiment "Alberta's Regiment"**

The Light is also known as "Alberta's Regiment" because it is the only Regiment with "Alberta" in its name and comprises more of Alberta's most famous regiments as a result of a series of unit amalgamations.

Light Horse regiments are traditionally composed of mounted troops. Historically, Light Horse units were recruited from the most distinguished and experienced of the regiments of various companies.

Units of Alberta Regiments have been drawn from soldiers, officers of nearly every rank, village and city in the province since 1885. Some of our soldiers serve at Canadian Forces regiments and garrisons, but of course the same desire to serve is present wherever they find their duty.

The history of the South Alberta Light Horse Regiment is a story of over evolving formations, concentrations and unit amalgamations.

The regular light cavalry unit in Alberta was the Rocky Mountain Rangers who were raised in 1861 in response to the North West Rebellion. This unit as regular cavalry made up of 150 of the best men. They were trained to conduct operations in the Rocky Mountains and were the first to be recruited to the Light Horse.

The roots of the South Alberta Light Horse Regiment can be traced to the 18th century of four military regiments: A Squadron - Calgary, B Squadron - Fort of the Redoubt, C Squadron - High River and D Squadron - Cochrane.

At the outbreak of the Second World War, the South Alberta Regiment was formed. It consisted of two active regiments: the 12th Alberta Light Horse - Edmonton and the 19th Alberta Light Horse - Edmonton. It also included the 1st Alberta Light Horse - Edmonton and the 2nd Alberta Light Horse - Medicine Hat. In 1944, a reorganization of the South Alberta Light Horse was formed in Edmonton. The 19th Alberta Light Horse was amalgamated into the South Alberta Light Horse in 2009.

The South Alberta Light Horse Regiment remains as one of the five remaining Light Horse regiments within the Commonwealth.

While Covid-19 restrictions are no longer in effect, we have quite a few cases circulating among our members and it seems to affect each person differently, some are more sick than others. As a result we had to adjust/change some of our plans at the club last minute, when a few of our key volunteers contracted Covid. Our apologies for any inconvenience this may have caused.

Hopefully we will all be healthy and enjoy the brunch we planned on May 1, while celebrating both Kings Day (King Willem-Alexander's birthday April 27) and Liberation Day (Bevrijdingsdag in the Netherlands on May 5<sup>th</sup>).

I also want to take this opportunity to wish a Happy Mothers day on May 8<sup>th</sup> to all the mothers, I hope you get spoiled, you deserve it.

## Remembrance Day: May 4<sup>th</sup>, in the Netherlands

Remembrance Day (*Doden Herdenking*) in the Netherlands commemorates all Dutch victims since the Second World War. These are soldiers and civilians who died in war situations and in peacekeeping operations.



Commemorations are held at a local war memorial in all municipalities in the Netherlands. National commemoration takes place in the following way throughout the Netherlands:

- Between 20:00 and 20:02 everyone is silent for 2 minutes. The Dutch flag (without pennant) is flown at half-mast from 6 p.m. to sunset. There are often activities after 8:02 PM, such as laying wreaths and flowers.
- Public places and shops should take the commemoration of the dead into account. That means:  
Preferably no parties and the like.  
Preferably no music and activities between 19:45 and 20:15. It must in any case be possible for visitors to observe 2 minutes of silence between 20:00 and 20:02.
- Shops close at 7pm. This is stated in the Shopping Hours Act. But a municipality can give shops permission to remain open.

### **Date and time commemoration of the dead**

The national commemoration is always on May 4. Even if this day is a Sunday or coincides with a religious holiday. The commemoration of May 4 starts in the Netherlands at 6 p.m. and ends at sunset. This is approximately 9:10 PM.

### **2 minutes of silence in remembrance of the dead**

The 2 minutes of silence are in the Netherlands from 20:00 to 20:02. In the Caribbean part of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, this is from 6:00 PM to 6:02 PM.

In other places in the world, the 2 minutes of silence are at an opportune time. Usually this is in the early evening.



# PELLA, IOWA

On April 1st Aris and I started a 2,400 km trip to Iowa carrying with us all the Dutch costumes that were no longer needed at our Dutch Canadian Club. Our car was full of boxes and it took us three days to get there. The weather was great, sunny but a bit windy.

After arriving in Pella we had a chance to look around and find out about the history of this town with a population of approx. 10,000 people. We saw many Dutch gables on the buildings, an actual canal with a working drawbridge and many places where tulips started to peek above the ground.

We visited the Historical Village and the Vermeer Windmill. What started as one building has grown to a 22-building complex, covering Pella's history beginning in the 1840s. Inside the Historical Village we saw a Blacksmith shop, Log cabin, Sod house, Werkplaats where wooden shoes are made, Bakery from 1850, Meat & cheese shop, and a replica of the first Church. Also The Boyhood Home of Wyatt Earp who lived in Pella during his teenage years.

In Heritage Hall are displays of antiques, costumes, and vignettes of Dutch daily life, as well as Goliath, a large authentic Dutch street organ and David, a small one.

We toured the Vermeer Windmill, boasting to be the tallest working windmill in North America. The foundation, which was built in Pella, has four different levels each with a different display, and the working top unit was built in the Netherlands, then disassembled and shipped to Pella where it was reassembled by the Dutch company that built it. The mill is licenced to mill wheat only.

Pella was established in 1847 by a group of 800 Dutch settlers from the province of Utrecht, led by Dominie Scholte. The group arrived on four ships in Baltimore and traveled to Louisiana. They were taken advantage of by the locals because they seemed to be very well off. From there they looked for a place to settle together and found it in Iowa. Dominie Scholte was their spiritual, practical and formal leader. He is credited with founding the town itself, and was heavily involved in the town's early economic development.

After the initial hardships the town continued to thrive and in 1935 it was decided that their Dutch roots should be celebrated, so the annual Tulip Festival was born. That first festival lacked tulips, so a local cabinet-maker, made 125 four-foot-tall wooden tulips, which were placed in flagpole holes around the square. A tulip committee was formed to make sure 85,000 tulips were planted that fall. Dutch antiques were showcased in merchants' windows, and some locals wore heirloom clothing or makeshift costumes. The one-day festival program began with a Town Crier and Burgemeester, a Maypole drill, Dutch songs, and speeches. The event was so successful even without parades, food vendors, and real tulips, that planning for the next year began immediately.

The festival has become a huge tourist attraction with parades, performances, food vendors, displays and demonstrations. The local population dresses in Dutch costumes for the parades which features many floats, bicycles, and families on foot. The costumes the Dutch Canadian Club donated were very welcome and will be put to good use.



## INVICTUS GAMES 2022 - THE HAGUE

The Invictus Games, a sports competition for physically or mentally injured soldiers, were held in The Hague in April. Prince Harry, Duke of Sussex and his wife Meghan, the Duchess of Sussex, were in attendance.

Prince Harry launched the international sporting event, with the first event held in London in 2014, to promote recovery through sports and build a broader understanding and respect for wounded service members and veterans. The sports competition was held in Orlando two years later, then in Toronto in 2017 and in Sydney in 2018.

Close to 100,000 people were in attendance and 500 participants from twenty countries competed in the events.

On the final day King Willem-Alexander watched the finals of wheelchair basketball, where he met Prince Harry. The Prince announced that the Invictus Games 2025 will be held in Vancouver and Whistler, British Columbia. These will be the most innovative and accessible Games ever held, and for the first time will include adaptive winter sports such as alpine skiing, Nordic skiing, skeleton and wheelchair curling. The

2025 Games will be held in partnership between True Patriot Love Foundation, the Government of Canada, the province of British Columbia and First Nations in Vancouver and Whistler.



Invictus, the Latin for “unconquered,” embodies the fighting spirit of those competing at the Games, and the incredible will they possess in continuing to overcome the challenges they face.



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## BLOEMENCORSO April 23, 2022

Lisse - The annual Bloemencorso of the Bollenstreek is the largest spring festival in The Netherlands. This colourful, fragrant spectacle is celebrated annually during one week of the year by more than one million visitors.

The main highlight of the event is the parade on Saturday when the colourful floats and the luxury vehicles decorated in masses of flowers travel the 42 km route.

“Celebrating memories” was the theme of the 75th parade, which opened with a float with a whale: to honor the very first float, where it all began in 1947.

This year the floats featured many different animals: besides whales and fish there were tigers, toucans, sea gulls and swans and a bull. The Rabobank float referred to the plight of the bees.

This year's parade was a special one. Last year the Dutch Flower Parade was added to the UNESCO's International List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity.

# Amazon Security

The other day the telephone rang, and a male voice with a Pakistani accent asked me if I was Harold Bens, I said yes that's me. He introduced himself as David Williams of Amazon Security and told me that a \$1000 purchase was made on my account.

I immediately exploded! I've had many scams before, but this one struck me as a possibility. David Williams is not a name you would associate with a Pakistani accent, but who knows? I could not remember exactly when I purchased something from Amazon but maybe, just maybe my account was still valid.

He continued, I should go to my computer, and he would direct me how to Download a website to cancel the purchase. Sitting behind my computer he was trying to direct me by clicking on certain things repeatedly.

I must confess, I'm not a computer expert but I'm not a dummy. I'm using Microsoft and McAfee to keep my computer safe, write stories on my computer for the Senior Paper and use my computer for a lot of other things. I never store any financial information on my computer, but I don't know a lot of other computer things and never do any downloading as that could carry viruses.

However, he went on and on and kept telling me do this and that and after I did it he said no, no, you did not do what I said. One of the things he told me to turn my virus protection off but that was not possible because McAfee was provided by Shaw Cable.

He kept on directing me for 1.5 hours and after he noticed that I was getting desperate, he said OK, Harold let's stop and I'll be back.

In the meantime, I told the story to my son what happened. He told me, when he phones back, just ask him for the last 4 digits of the credit card number that was used for the purchase.

Surely, the next day, the telephone rang, the voice said, this is David Williams, remember me? He asked me if I was ready again for the downloading. I said, sure, but before we go on, could you please give me the last 4 digits of my credit card number that was used for the purchase of \$1000. He told me that he could not give me that at the present time.

I told him "Go to Hell" and hung up. He never phoned back again and luckily my computer was not compromised.

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*Note from the editor:*

If somebody advises that you should install the Team Viewer app, or any software on to your computer, **DON'T DO IT**. There is no need to install anything on your computer. If you have reached this stage in the call, refuse point blank to download anything and hang up and regard this as suspicious.

Contact the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre. Toll-free: 1-888-495-8501. If you get a suspicious call, hang up right away and contact your local police. You should also report the scam to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre <https://www.antifraudcentre-centreantifraude.ca/>. The Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre collects information on fraud and identity theft. They provide information on past and current scams affecting Canadians by providing a list of many scams. If you think you're a victim of fraud, report it!
