On May 5, 1945, the negotiation for the surrender of German forces in the Netherlands took place at Hotel de Wereld in Wageningen. Canadian Corps commander Lieutenant-General Charles Foulkes, accompanied by Canadian Brigadier-General George Kitching and Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands, accepted the capitulation of German commander-in-chief Generaloberst Johannes Blaskowitz.

The official signing of the capitulation document occurred on May 6, 1945, in the auditorium of Rijks Landbouw Hoogeschool, which is located next door to the hotel.

This historic event is celebrated every May 5 as Netherlands' Liberation Day national holiday.

The Keukenhof and its history

When here in Alberta spring has barely started, in the Netherlands the Tulip season and the season of other flowering bulbs is already coming to an end. For instance the world famous Keukenhof garden is only open to the public from mid-March to Mid-May and will be closing it's gate on May 12th. This garden is located on 32 hectares of land, with 40 gardeners working to maintain and showcase around 7 million flowering bulbs, and it is a top tourist destination in the Netherlands.



The Keukenhof is celebrating its 75th anniversary this year. Back in 1949 the current mayor of Lisse and 20 leading flower bulb growers and exporters came up with the idea of using the Keukenhof to showcase spring season bulbs. The planting of numerous bulbs got underway and when they opened to the public, in the spring of 1950, the garden was an instant success with 200.000 visitors in just that first year. In recent years the garden receives around one and a half million visitors during the 2 short months they are open.



The Keukenhof garden is located near the town of Lisse in the province of South Holland and is part of the larger Keukenhof estate. Even when the flower garden is closed, the Keukenhof grounds around the castle remain open to the public all year. In the summer people can enjoy the beautiful Dahlia gardens and it is a popular stopover for cycle tours and sight seeing tours. There is a restaurant, De Hofboerderij, located near a petting zoo, where children can follow a 2 km gnome trail. Located on the grounds is also the "LAM": Lisser Art Museum, with displays focusing on food and consumption. Behind the estate lies the extensive Keukenhof forest, well worth

exploring since the woods are located on an authentic beach ridge. The landscape as it was before excavations for bulb cultivation and the construction of towns began in many other areas.

Historically this whole area was part of the Teylingen Castle estate with hunting taking place in the wide strip of land in the dunes called Keukenduyn (Kitchen Dunes), providing the meat for the kitchen. In the



15th Century, the Teylingen Castle was in possession and home of Countess Jacoba Van Beieren (Jacqueline of Bavaria). She created and tended an herb garden near her kitchen, leading to the name Keuken Hof or Kitchen Courtyard or Kitchen Garden.

Jacoba was countess of Holland and Zeeland and played a large role in history during times when the business of politics and power and the struggle for land ownership was mainly a man's domain.

Jacoba Van Beieren (1401-1436) was

born in the count's castle of Le Quesnoy in Hainaut in Belgium. She was the daughter of Count William VI and Margaret of Burgundy. She did not lead an easy life, living in very turbulent times, during the conflicts called "Hoekse and Kabeljouwse Twisten" (Hook and Cod Conflicts, 1345-1492). She became a pawn in the aristocrats' struggle and fight for power and political influence. She was married off in 1406, at the age of 5, to French prince John of Touraine the dauphin or crown prince of France. The marriage was solemnized in The Hague in 1415 when she was 14 years old.



John died in 1417 and Jacoba was a widow at 16 years old. A few months later her father Count Willem VI also died and she became Countess of Holland, Zeeland and Hainaut. Her inheritance was constantly being challenged and she was caught in the middle of the many battles being fought for power and position. She married her 4th cousin John of Brabant to strengthen her own position, but the marriage was declared invalid by the pope. She went to England and married Humphrey of Gloucester the son of King Henry I in 1423. She returned with Humphrey to defend Hainaut in 1424, fighting against her ex-husband John of Brabant, but the town was captured and she was imprisoned in Ghent. The Hooks decided she could be of benefit to them and helped her escape disguised in men's clothing.

Meanwhile her marriage to Humphrey was also annulled since the church decided she was still married to John of Brabant. After many challenges, intrigues and battles, she lost most of her possessions and her titles. (The politics between the Hooks and Cods are too complicated to go further into). She married her fourth husband Frank Van Borssele and took up residence at Castle Teylingen, (at the Keukenhof) where she spent the last years of her life in seclusion. She died of tuberculosis at the young age of 35 on October 9, 1436. In her short life she was constantly involved in combat for power and position and her name would go into history filled with myths and legends. She is still remembered by streets and places named after her and there is a statue of her in the town of Woudrichem in the province of North Brabant.

After Jacoba's death the grounds were owned by wealthy merchant families. In 1857 six additional towers were added to the castle when the estate was bought by Baron and Baroness Van Pallandt. They had the father and son architect team Zocher redesign the gardens in the English garden style. This design is still forming the basis for the Keukenhof gardens today.

The Dutch royal family were out in full force for the annual festival, which marks the birthday of King Willem-Alexander, this year heading to the town of Emmen in the north east. The king and queen were joined by their three daughters - Princess Ariane, 17, Princess Amalia, 20, and 18-year-old Princess Alexia, all of whom were in shades of green, blue and orange. The family walked a route through the town, collecting gifts of flowers and greeting onlookers who had gathered to wish the royal family well on King's Day.

Ban on smoke flavour may be worst case scenario for Hema sausage

"Boerenkool met worst" is the ultimate in Dutch cooking.

A decision by the European Commission to ban the use of harmful smoke flavourings could spell the end of the iconic Dutch "smoked" sausage, Dutch media are reporting.

A special EU committee is looking at ending the use of flavourings in sausages and other products in April following research showing the process to produce an

artificial smoky taste leaves harmful chemicals that have been linked to cancer and infertility.

Dutch rookworst, or smoked sausage, whose most famous producers are Hema and Unox, used to be smoked over a fire until the 1970s. That option would not be an alternative if the flavouring is discontinued, a Unilever spokesman told the newspaper Algemeen Dagblad, because of the detrimental effects of wood smoke on human health and the environment.

The traditional smoked sausage, which is now boiled and smoke-flavoured, put Unox on the map 87 years ago. But all is not lost, the spokesman said. "If there is a ban on the current flavourings there will probably be a transition period in which we can look for other solutions to preserve the taste," he told the paper.

Máxima television series seeks to rule international airwaves

Queen Máxima's life and times are getting the royal treatment in Máxima, a new series that debuted on the 20th of April on Videoland with a six episode first season. It's the latest tv programme hoping to replicate the success of The Crown. The popular series that covered the reign of queen Elizabeth wrapped up its sixth and final season in December and has racked up numerous awards including two Golden Globes. But is there enough drama surrounding the Dutch royals to hold the attention of both local and international viewers?

That remains to be seen, but critical response to Máxima in the Netherlands has been mixed and somewhat bizarre after the press and guests were shown the first two episodes last week. A reviewer for De Volkskrant gave the series four stars out of five and praised the performance of Argentinean actress Delfina Chaves in the title role. Meanwhile, another critic wished the series featured 'more nudity.'

A second season is already in the works and was announced earlier this week. Production is scheduled to begin in October. The first season largely focuses on Máxima's courtship with then crown prince Willem-Alexander. It's based on Dutch journalist Marcia Luyten's Máxima Zorreguieta: Motherland, a biography released in the lead-up to the queen's 50th birthday. Despite the premise, viewers shouldn't expect a sunshiny rom-com. The series also delves into the controversies surrounding Máxima's father, Jorge Zorreguieta. He served as Argentina's minister for agriculture during the infamous regime of military dictator Jorge Rafael Videla. While Zorreguieta managed to avoid prosecution for the regime's human rights violations and denied any involvement, Máxima's engagement with Willem-Alexander was questioned by pundits and politicians. Their marriage had to be approved by parliament before they were allowed to wed in 2002. There was also one major concession: Zorreguieta wasn't allowed to attend the ceremony.

"We took some time to think about how to approach the politics, because you want to be authentic but, on the other hand, you don't want to start a whole political discussion," series producer Rachel van Bommel told Variety. "We decided to take the point of view of Máxima herself, and by taking her perspective, you don't have to have an opinion about it, you can just be factual."

Máxima's official Dutch debut on Videoland was set for Saturday, 20 April and will later be released in at least 25 international markets.

Máxima herself has reportedly no plans to watch the show, and says she has not read the book either. But she also, according to the AD, said she and her husband completely support the right to artistic freedom, and for film makers to make whatever suits them.





Bright spark: How a Dutch architect revived the Olympic flame

With 100 days to go until the opening ceremony in Paris, the Olympic flame has been lit, continuing a tradition that began in Amsterdam in 1928.

Dutch architect Jan Wils was the man who revived the idea of the flame, which harks back to the sacred fire that burned during the ancient Olympic games in Athens.



Wils designed the stadium for the 1928 Games, including the 40-metre high Marathon Tower. He wanted the flame to burn at the top of the tower so that people could see for miles around that the event was taking place.

Wils was awarded an Olympic gold medal for architecture for his efforts, in the days when medals were awarded for achievements in the arts, including literature, sculpture and painting. He intended the tower with its burning flame to rival Amsterdam's church spires in the otherwise low-rise skyline. Many Christian politicians opposed staging the Olympics in the city, regarding it as a heathen event.

The lighting of the flame in Athens also marks the first stage of the torch relay, but that component was added by the Nazis for the 1936 Olympics in Berlin.

After the flame was lit on April 16, 2024 the flame was passed to Greek rower Stefanos Douskos, who won gold in the single sculls in Tokyo four years ago. The second leg is being run by

French former swimmer Laure Manadou. The flame will arrive in Marseille by ship on May 8, where the relay route will continue through France, including French overseas territories such as Guyana and Martinique. After arriving in Paris for Bastille Day, July 14, it will go on a tour of the metropolitan area before being conveyed to the stadium for the opening ceremony on July 26.
